The program employs three strategies: restore and protect floodplains and wetlands in the 10-state river corridor; reduce agricultural pollution in four states along the northern half of the river (MN, WI, IA, and IL); and achieve cross-boundary and interagency coordination among government agencies to improve water quality and resilience. FINDING COMMON **GROUND...**

In 2014, led by the National Sustainable Agriculture Coalition in conjunction with several McKnight grantees and partners, a diverse group of stakeholders provided evidence for stronger conservation provisions in the Farm Bill. The variety of interests that came together — environmental, hunting and fishing, taxpayer, and sustainable agriculture — reflects the vast array of sectors that benefit from policies supporting a healthy Mississippi.

...TO PROTECT OUR GREATEST RIVER.

The effort resulted in conservation compliance provisions for federally subsidized crop insurance, requiring farmers to implement conservation practices to qualify. In Minnesota alone there were 17.5 million acres of insured crops in 2013, and farmers received \$1.2 billion in indemnities. The new provisions are a strong incentive to incorporate

Results of a Living Cities survey indicate over 80% of partners aligned resources and transcended geographic and sector boundaries because of the work. The Metropolitan Council, Hennepin County, and Minneapolis and St. Paul city governments adjusted staffing to better deploy practices that promote our region's vitality.

McKnight's annual neuroscience conference provides opportunities for neuroscientists to present, observe, and discuss their research in an organic and flexible environment. Based on reporting from awardees, nearly 16% of the 107 attendees at the 2014 conference developed substantive collaborative discussions while in attendance. Moreover, we know from conference attendees that these interactions often precipitate reevaluation and new thinking, leading to concrete changes in research methodology and practice — which, ultimately, lead to better science to treat people suffering from diseases of the brain.

A powerful lever making Greater Minnesota more prosperous is the McKnight- and Blandin-hosted Regional Economic Development (RED) Group, working to promote regional collaboration for economic vitality. In 2014, coordinated RED Group leadership led to the broadening of the governor's "Elements of The State's Dashboard" to include data indicators that shed light on economic, civic, and health professional sectors; rural/urban disparities; quality of place; and the cost of government. 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

n 2014, McKnight's board of directors committed to using 10% of the \$2.2 billion endowment for impact investing. The program identifies market opportunities to align investment dollars with grantmaking efforts to transition to a low-carbon economy and to build a stronger, sustainable metropolitan community. PUTTING MONEY IN THE BANK...

In 2014, we reassessed the greenhouse gas (GHG) performance of a \$100 million portfolio and asked ourselves and our fund manager whether we could do better. Working with Mellon Capital Management and our two investment consultants, Imprint Capital and Mercer, we explored how to weight companies differently based on a relative per-unit-of-sale measurement of GHG production and whether they are strategically positioned to respond to climate change.

...TO HELP ACHIEVE OUR MISSION.

McKnight provided the seed funding for the Carbon Efficiency Strategy, a new fund that is now widely available to institutional investors. Benchmarked against the Russell 3000 Index, this broad market stock fund reduces the GHG production over the index by more than 50% and removes coal investments entirely. It also overweights companies that are "climate-ready" and reduces exposure to poor performers. By investing in this new strategy we raised our overall commitment to aligned investments to 15% of our endowment total.

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DRAWING ON DATA...

In 2012, McKnight along with several other funders and arts organizations worked together to bring the Cultural Data Project (CDP) — a robust data system for and about arts and culture organizations — to Minnesota. The scope was unprecedented in its level of detail and aggregate power to strengthen the field's ability to show value and impact in communities. McKnight incorporated the CDP into its grant application process.

...TO ILLUSTRATE ARTS IMPACT.

Three years later, data from the CDP has led to *Creative Minnesota*, the most comprehensive report ever done about the sector's health and impact. Among a host of indicators, the report includes economic data collected by Americans for the Arts and provides a detailed snapshot of statewide and regional spending by nonprofit arts and culture organizations and their audiences. Perhaps most importantly, it establishes benchmarks for future collaborative comparison, analysis, and decisionmaking.

SHARING INSIGHT TODAY...

In late 2014, the Department of Employment and Economic Development released the Minnesota Clean Energy Economy Profile, the most comprehensive effort to date to quantify the businesses, employment, wages, and investments engaged in the state's clean energy economy. Our Midwest Climate & Energy program supported the report together with the Energy Foundation and our Region & Communities program. Among other data, the study showed clean energy jobs growing faster (by 11%) and paying better (by 42%) than other sectors.

...TO FOSTER A CLEAN ENERGY FUTURE.

McKnight and our partners recognized the importance of making clean energy jobs data more widely accessible, given the tremendous growth in the industry. This recognition sparked the Clean Energy Economy Minnesota project — a website taking the report data as a starting point, to be updated on a regular basis and serve as a resource for clean energy businesses, government, academia, and nonprofits to build on today's successes now and into the future.

GIVING TEACHERS NEW TOOLS...

A key component of McKnight's early literacy work is the Pathway Schools Initiative, a partnership between the Foundation, the Urban Education Institute, and seven Twin Cities schools serving high-needs students. The initiative employs two benchmarking tools: STEP (Strategic Teaching and Evaluation of Progress) and 5Essentials (5E). These tools help measure outcomes and provide a common language and data source to share successes and troubleshoot challenges.

...TO BUILD PATHWAYS FOR YOUNG READERS.

As part of the Pathway Schools Initiative, UEI has established Literacy and Leadership Collaboratives, practical forums for shared learning among pathway school leaders and staff. Among many promising results in 2014, a perfect 100% of pathway schools show strength in either "collective responsibility" or "teacher-to-teacher trust," two key 5E measures which research has shown to be indicators of school success.

USING THE POWER OF THE WEB...

Agroecological Intensification (AEI) is defined as improving the performance of agricultural systems through integration of ecological principles into farm management. AEI is a guiding principle behind our crop research work. In late 2014, the CCRP launched the AEI Exchange (AEIx) — a web-based information-sharing tool for researchers, a platform for generating and sharing evidence for AEI, and a forum and knowledge base for those interested in the field.

...TO GROW A NETWORK OF RESEARCHERS.

Although still quite new, the AEIx is already showing promise as a bridge between crop research and real-world farming. As of February 2015, the website includes 425 pages of substantive content, and the discussion forums include 242 topics, 337 users, and 955 posts. Perhaps even more important, site content is designed to be flexible and responsive to the needs of users; as a result of user input, dormant sections have been discontinued and new sections on burgeoning areas have been added.
